ABOUT OUR SCHOOL

Located near the old railroad yards, Terminal Park Elementary School, built in 1945, adopted a railroad theme after a renovation in 1981. The school serves students from a variety of socio-economic and cultural groups. Terminal Park Elementary School is also the site of the district's gifted education program for elementary school students. The STEP (Student Teacher Enrichment Program) classes consist of students from many of the 14 elementary schools. Selection for the program takes place in the spring of the students' third grade year in school.

OUR SCHOOL BUILDING

Extensively remodeled in 1981, Terminal Park Elementary School combines the feeling of an older school with a sense of light and space. The building has a six-classroom primary wing to the north. Ten intermediate classrooms are housed in the main building, as well as the library, reading specialist room, ELL room, resource room, and gym. Two portables house a third and fifth grade class. Both the gym and library frequently provide community meeting space. Terminal Park Elementary School was renovated during the summer of 1997. Improvements included telephones in every classroom and electrical and data wiring for additional computer capacity in each room. Classrooms in the building have a computer which is networked to the district data system. Each

classroom is also equipped with a television. The televisions are connected to a closed circuit television system in the library.

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ASSESSMENT

Testing Students in Washington State

Washington uses the grades 3-8 Measurements of Student Progress (MSP), the High School Proficiency Exam (HSPE) and End-of-Course (EOC) exams to test its students. The HSPE and EOCs are used as the state's high school exit exams.

For English language learners (ELL), the state translates the math and science exams into six languages (Spanish, Russian, Korean, Chinese, Vietnamese and Somali). Students can listen to the test questions on a CD, but must answer in English. This covers about 80 percent of the ELL population in our state.

Measurements of Student Progress (MSP)

The MSP is the state's exam for students in grades 3-8. Testing is one subject per day, with the writing test occurring on two days. Students are tested in reading (grades 3-8), math (grades 3-8), writing (grades 4 & 7) and science (grades 5 & 8).

High School Proficiency Exam (HSPE)

HSPEs are comprehensive exams that measure the basic proficiency of high school students in reading and writing, and serve as the state's exit exams in those subjects.

Students must pass one HSPE in reading and one in writing to satisfy a portion of the graduation assessment requirements.

End-of-Course (EOC) Exams

EOCs measure the knowledge of students in algebra 1/integrated math 1, geometry/integrated math 2 and biology when they complete each course. They serve as the state's exit exams for math and science.

Students in the classes of 2013 and 2014 must pass one math EOC in algebra 1/integrated math 1 or geometry/integrated math 2 to satisfy a portion of the graduation assessment requirements.

Students in the class of 2015 and beyond must pass one math EOC in algebra 1/ integrated math 1 or geometry/integrated math 2, and the biology EOC to satisfy a portion of the graduation assessment requirements.

Washington Alternate Assessment System (WAAS)

About one percent of students participate in the WAAS, a challenging program for some students in special education.

Washington English Language Proficiency Assessment (WELPA)

The WELPA annually assesses growth in English language development by the state's English language learners. This assessment tests reading, writing, listening and speaking knowledge and skills.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

Terminal Park Elementary School's principal, staff, and parents have a vision of the educational process, which celebrates the dignity and uniqueness of each individual. Their goal is to provide the opportunity for each student to receive a quality education. To fulfill this goal, they strive to be positive role models treating each student as an individual with unique talents and skills. Staff teaches to a variety of learning styles and provides opportunities for all students to feel successful.

Each year, the staff examines the performance of students as based on various assessment data such as the MSP (Measure of Student Progress), MAP (Measure of Academic Progress), and DIBELS (Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills). Staff engages in professional development related to the needs of students at Terminal Park Elementary School. As the students make gains, new goals are set. If an area arises that does not meet the goal of the school, changes are made to the strategies employed to deliver instruction.

WHAT IS SPECIAL ABOUT OUR SCHOOL?

Special Programs, Events, Activities

Terminal Park Elementary School's entire staff works together toward helping students achieve. The maintenance workers, bus drivers, cooks, office personnel, counselors, paraeducators, and teachers all support students in being successful.

One component that strengthens the school is the incorporation of Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS). PBIS emphasizes teaching clear expectations, reinforcing good choices, disciplining effectively, and analyzing data to determine how to improve. In addition to maintaining a safe learning environment, the ultimate goal is to guide students to development habits that will help them be successful throughout life.

Terminal Park Elementary School has adopted Steps to Respect and Second Steps to help students and staff address the needs of students regarding issues around the treatment of others. They focus on a specific social skill each month. Through staff instruction, it is hoped that students gain the ability to recognize, confront, and report incidents that make them uncomfortable or that may be interpreted as bullying. The staff strives to help students develop skills to be effective problem solvers while also building relationships with students and making sure they feel comfortable reporting problems and asking for help.

Terminal Park Elementary School's PTA offers critical support for the school. The PTA has supported fundraisers that have enabled staff to purchase new playground equipment, hundreds of books for the library, computer software for the Accelerated Reader and Accelerated Math programs, and helped those in need around the holidays.

The arts are incorporated at Terminal Park Elementary School. Research shows that the arts can help students achieve in reading, writing, and math. In addition to lessons related to visual art and music during the school day, there are some extracurricular opportunities for students to be involved in drama productions.

The Associated Student Body of Terminal Park Elementary School is extremely active and well organized. Activities sponsored by the ASB include field trips, assemblies, and the school safety patrol program. Students in ASB gain hands-on experience in leadership roles and develop a great sense of character and responsibility.

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TITLE I PROGRAM

Terminal Park Elementary School is a school-wide Title I school. All students receive Title I reading services in their regular education program. The master schedule is created in such a way as to allow students to receive specific instruction at their independent reading level for a concentrated portion of the day in addition to the whole group reading instruction. The Terminal Park Elementary School Title I Program is supported by a tremendous amount of expertise in the paraeducators. The paraeducators have received training in reading models, instructional delivery, and assessment options. The Title I Program supports the efforts of the entire school in the goal to meet the needs of students and develop lifelong learners for years to come.

Terminal Park Elementary School has a site coordinator from Communities in Schools of Auburn. This individual, Mrs. Woolman, documents support provided through Communities in Schools of Auburn and also works to provide academic intervention, goal-setting curriculum, community resource connections, and after-school soccer.
