Director's Notes

I've always had a fascination with mythology. It's very universal; every culture has its own, and they are all very similar in their storytelling explaining life, our world, and the universe. If you've read any of Joseph Campbell's work you understand this: The hero's journey/quest, the trickster, and characters that explain earth and sky, the seasons, love, envy, lust, life and death.

With *The Lightning Thief* we have a modern take on a story loosely based on the Greek hero myth of Perseus. This musical is based on the first book in the Percy Jackson series. A popular collection of books that is at the level of *Harry Potter* in popularity.

I am new to this series and was introduced to it via the musical. (I later realized I'd watched a movie that takes many unpopular liberties with the story). I've only read the first book but loved it. I found out my students did too and when I started talking about producing the musical the feedback was overwhelmingly positive.

The themes this version touches on are perfect for a young company and audience but not exclusive to that group in its lessons: Self discovery, perseverance, finding inner strength, and learning that we all have challenges, but those challenges can be the very thing that makes us warriors able to fight the monsters of the 'real world.'

I love working with these students. It is the best part of my day to walk into the theater and create with them. Thank you to my young artists for trusting me! I love you all and love your resilience, dedication, and energy.

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
