

Standardized Testing

SAT and ACT

The Auburn School District is offering the school-day SAT for juniors and seniors on Wednesday, March 24. Students who registered will receive information from their schools with logistics.

Students interested in taking the test at another time can find registration information <u>online</u>. Upcoming SAT dates are May 8 and June 5. Students wanting to take the ACT can find registration information <u>online</u>. Upcoming ACT dates are April 17, June 12, and July 17.

ASVAB

Students interested in pursuing military service or wanting to learn more about their career aptitude should take the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery). The test will be offered at the end of April at each high school. Students who are interested in take the ASVAB should complete this survey.

Getting your FSA ID -- The 1st step to completing the FAFSA and getting financial aid

Next steps after submitting the FAFSA

Once students submit, a family's financial information is analyzed using the federal need formula.

The Student Aid Report (SAR)

After the information students have provided is analyzed, they will receive a SAR that contains the data they entered on the FAFSA. The U.S. Department of Education will send this form to the student either by email or by postal mail.

Students should review the SAR carefully for errors (the form highlights items that may need attention) and follow directions for making and submitting corrections. Submit corrections promptly. They should keep a copy of the SAR for their records.

Expected Family Contribution (EFC)

On the front page of the SAR, your child will find a figure called the expected family contribution (EFC). The EFC is an indicator of your family's financial strength. It is sent to your state scholarship agency as well as to the colleges your child listed on the FAFSA. They use this number to determine your child's financial aid award. Learn more about the EFC.

Other Financial Aid Forms

After students complete the FAFSA, they should make sure to submit any additional financial aid forms that their colleges require. For example, some colleges require them to submit the CSS/Financial Aid PROFILE® or their own forms.
