STUDENT AND STAFF RECOGNITION

1. Recognition of Student

The Auburn School District Board of Directors will recognize Yesenia Scearcy, a fifth grade student at Alpac Elementary, for being an outstanding student.

Yesenia is an outstanding student and citizen. She has attended Alpac since she was in preschool and has continually demonstrated to staff what an amazing person she is. She is friendly, positive, caring, and outgoing.

Gail Storrs, Yesenia's teacher, said she is "hard working, conscientious, and has a wonderful sense of humor."

Yesenia is active at school. She plays the violin in the orchestra, performs in the fifth grade choir, and is a key player on the girls' basketball team.

Alpac principal Jim Riley said, "Yesenia is a great role model to all of our Alpac students, she has an incredible work ethic and positive attitude. I have never seen her without her trademark smile."

Yesenia's favorite subjects are reading and math. In her free time she likes to play basketball at the YMCA, play with her two year old brother, and hang out with friends.

Yesenia's mother is a teacher at Cascade Middle School. Yesenia enjoys the challenge of completing middle school work her mom brings home.

Yesenia hopes to study law and become the first female Latina president of the United States.

2. Recognition of Staff

The Auburn School District Board of Directors will recognize Dave Moynihan, counselor at Dick Scobee Elementary, for his outstanding service.

Dave is in his eighth year as the counselor at Dick Scobee. He came to school counseling after a 20-year career with Young Life youth ministry. After working in Russia his last three years with Young Life, Dave moved to California and became an elementary counselor before marrying and moving to Washington.

Originally from San Diego, Dave did his undergraduate work at Seattle Pacific University so Washington was familiar when he relocated here to his wife's home state.

Dave loves working with elementary students. He views his primary job as supporting Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) school-wide, which includes interventions for students who struggle behaviorally, as well as teaching social/emotional learning in the

classroom and small group setting. Using PBIS, Dave said is it very gratifying when the work pays off. Several students each year "graduate" from the interventions and, at Scobee, they make a big deal out of completing the programs that promote positive behaviors.

He said a lot of school districts do not have full-time elementary counselors and feels very supported in Auburn. "Dick Scobee has a great staff," said Dave, "They really care about kids."

Dick Scobee literacy specialist, Tim Pfab, said "Dave is always there if students need him. He is the resource for students crying on the first day of school, students who won't go to class, families having trouble putting food on the table or getting Christmas presents. He is friendly, upbeat, calm, trustworthy, and sincere."

Principal Adam Couch said, "Dave's commitment to serving the whole child has propelled our staff towards a better focus on relationships with kids in the context of helping them achieve academic success."

To continue his professional growth, Dave is currently working on his professional certification, condensing the one-year program into six months and is planning to finish in June.

Dave is an avid bike rider and, once the nicer weather begins, he usually makes the 15-mile ride from his Renton home to work at least four days per week. His vacations focus on biking as well. In 2010, he and his wife completed a bike trip from Vienna, Austria to Budapest, Hungary. This summer they will be taking a bike trip in the Dordogne Valley in France.

3. Gold Star Award

The Auburn School District Board of Directors will present the Gold Star Volunteer Award to Kathy Martin in recognition of her support to the Auburn School District.

After teaching French to middle and high school students for 30 years in Colorado, Kathy now does whatever she can to help in her grandchildren's classrooms at Lakeland Hills Elementary.

Her duties include working individually with students in math and reading, making copies, grading papers, and even making 160 crepes for the recent Dr. Seuss night!

Kathy is a full-time grandma now that she has retired from teaching. She began volunteering at Lakeland five years ago when her granddaughter was in second grade. That granddaughter now attends Mt. Baker but her grandson is in second grade now and her younger grandson will start kindergarten next year.

"I like being back in the educational setting. Lakeland has an exceptional staff and an exceptional principal," Kathy said.

Kathy believes the one-on-one time she spends with students really makes a difference.

Every Thursday you will find Kathy helping out with whatever needs to be done in Marla King's classroom.

Marla said Kathy does a wonderful job with the children and she always makes them feel good about themselves.

Kathy grew up in Ohio and went to the University of Strasbourg in France where she studied French history and literature. She received her teaching degree from the Otterbein University and her masters in teaching from Colorado College.

In addition to volunteering in Mrs. King's classroom, Kathy also teaches a half-hour per week French class in Mrs. Keith's third grade classroom where she teaches basic conversational French, culture, numbers, and the alphabet.

Kathy loves all things French and meets monthly with two different groups of French speakers to keep up her linguistic skills. She likes to read, go on walks, and travel.

Both her son and daughter work in the cruise industry. Her next cruise in May will take her to Belgium where she will get to employ her French language skills.

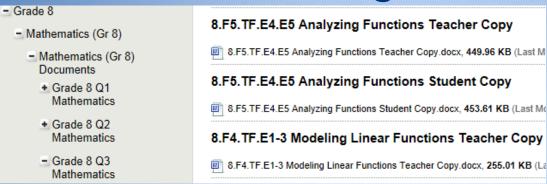

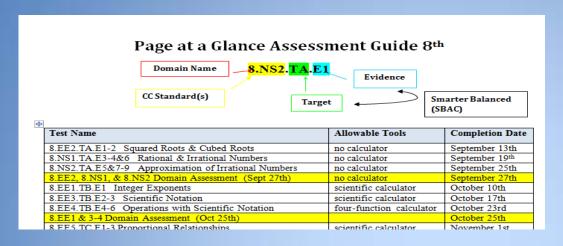

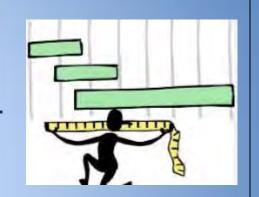

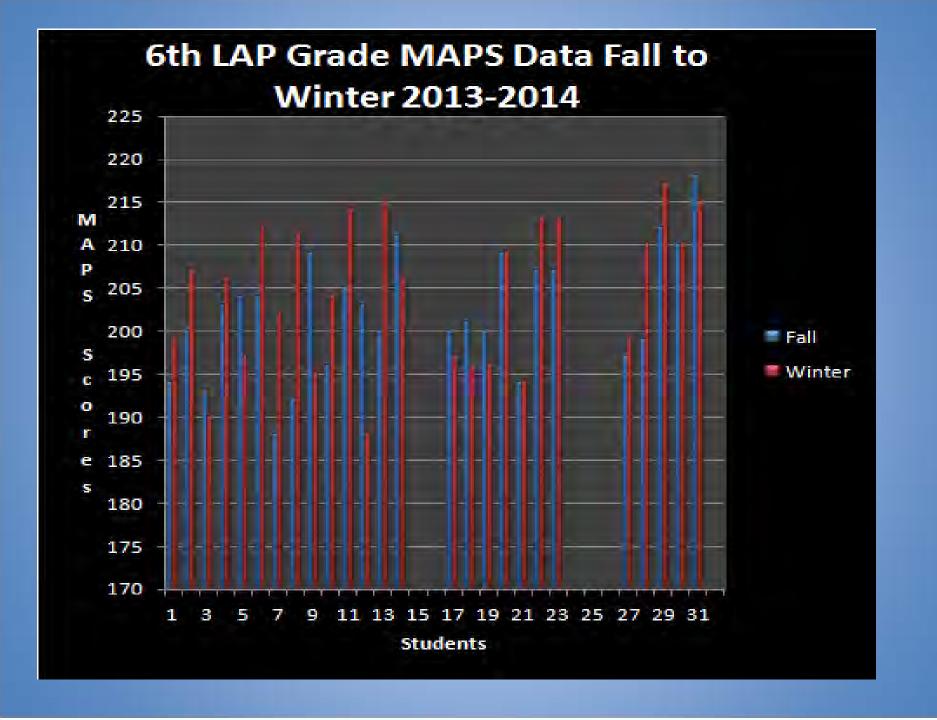

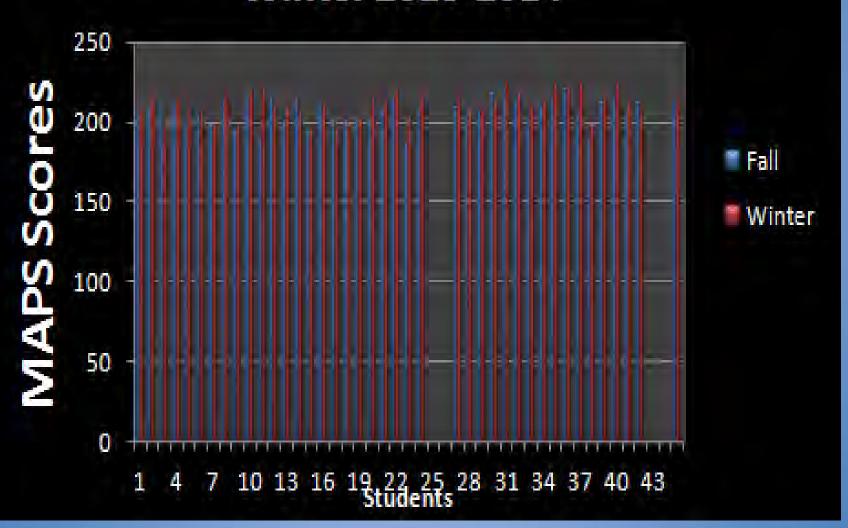

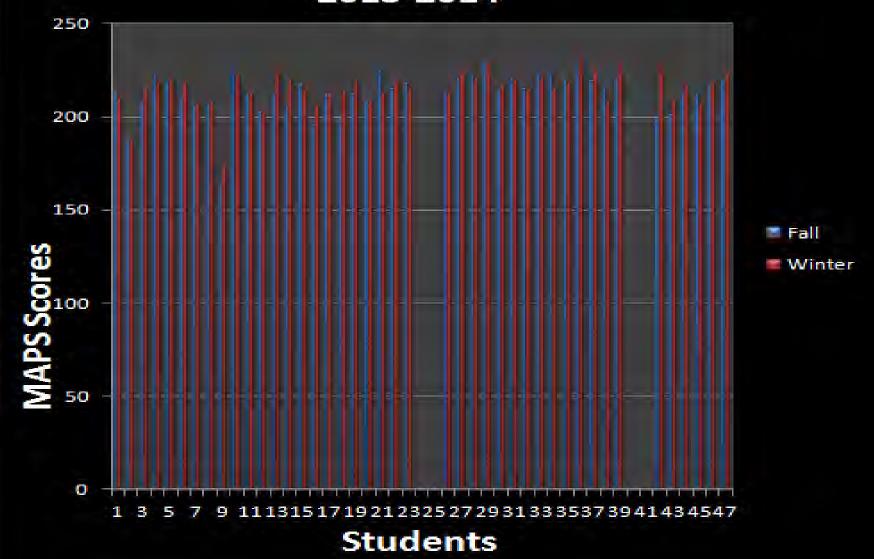




7th Grade LAP MAPS Data Fall to Winter 2013-2014

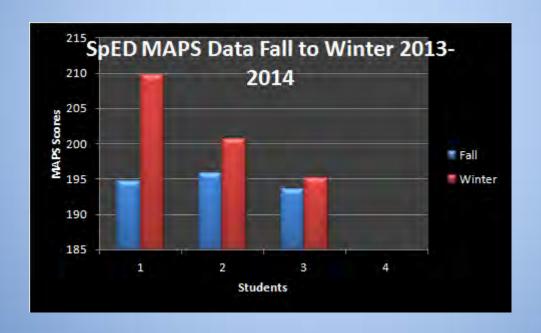


8th Grade LAP Data Fall to Winter 2013-2014

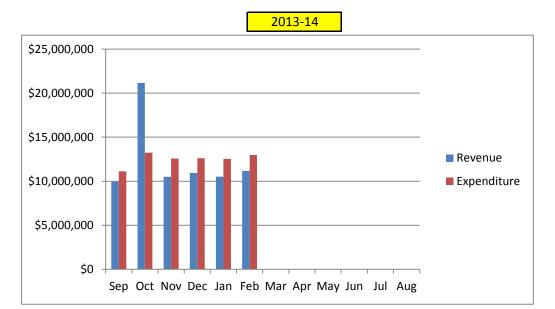

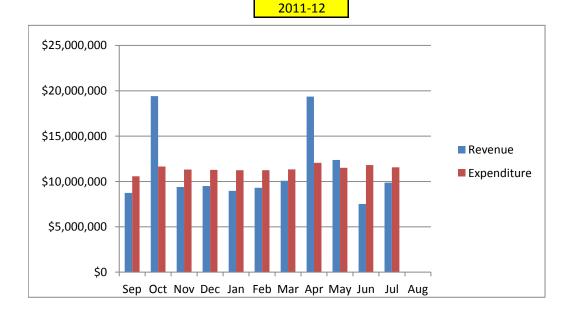
