Auburn Mountainview High School Awarded OSPI Navigation 101 Grant

For the second year in a row, Auburn Mountainview High School has been awarded an Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) Navigation 101 Grant to implement during the 2007-08 school year.

Navigation 101 is a comprehensive guidance and planning program that has helped many students around the state make clear and careful plans for life after high school, which is the culminating portfolio and presentation graduation requirement beginning with the graduating class of 2008.

Students in Auburn School District are preparing for their futures earlier than ever before. The culminating portfolio and presentation graduation requirement is unique because each school determines the guidelines of this requirement based on three statewide goals:

- Encourage students to think analytically, logically and creatively, and to integrate experience and knowledge to solve problems
- Give students a chance to explore a topic in which they have a great interest
- Offer students an opportunity to apply their learning in a "real world" way

This requirement may look different at each high school, yet all students will demonstrate essential skills through reading, writing, speaking, production and/or performance. The Navigation 101 Grant will allow Auburn Mountainview High School to continue its "ROAR" (Requirements of Academic Readiness) small group advisories. Students meet with the same advisor throughout their high school career. The advisory meets one to two times per month and provides students a forum to review their career pathways, ask questions and update their portfolio contents. Additionally, students are responsible for organizing yearly conferences with their parents and advisor. "Student-led conferences open up lines of communication between students and parents," according to ROAR advisor and German teacher DeAnna Kilga. "I've had parents tell me that they didn't know their child was interested in a particular line of work until the student-led conferences."

Students' portfolios are a collection of artifacts that define their interests, personality, community involvement and post-graduation plans. The student-designed portfolio launches learners in an organized, targeted way toward their futures. According to assistant principal Terri Herren, "Portfolios are four-year projects students begin in the ninth grade to help them stay on track with their selected career pathway and their current and future goals."

Beginning with the class of 2008, Auburn Mountainview seniors will have the opportunity to present their portfolios to a panel of educators and community members. The final presentation will last between 10-15 minutes and highlight the students' best works, how that work supports their career pathway, and how they plan to achieve their future goals. Currently West Auburn High School satisfies this graduation requirement in a similar fashion. Students create PowerPoint presentations highlighting their career and academic goals beyond high school and present to a panel of educators, community members and parents.

Now Kenlynn's "mom job" has turned into a full-time career. In 2005 Kenlynn left the Washington Elementary kitchen for the culinary arts program at Auburn Mountainview High School. On any given day Kenlynn is responsible for the kitchen flow for one breakfast and two lunches, which feed over 1,000 students per day. The unique aspect of the district's high school kitchens is that the students are preparing and dishing up the food. "You really get to know the kids working in the kitchen, because they're flowing in and out every day," says Kenlynn, "which is what I like most about my job."

Kenlynn has learned to think on her feet as she supervises the 24-30 students who man the various stations including cold prep, frying and stocking, ovens, baking and so on. "My kids are the manpower so it takes constant adjustment to keep up with the ebb and flow of the kitchen," says Kenlynn. "I call myself the 'traffic master." From food quality to correct temperature settings to safety to food presentation, Kenlynn is monitoring it all.

Despite the bustle, Kenlynn enjoys the slower times when she has the opportunity to better relate to the students. "My best quality is my personality," says Kenlynn. "I'm a people person and the kids know they can come and talk to me. I can be a mentor and listen to what's going on in their world."

Kenlynn has learned the most about the food service industry when she's jumped into the mix rather than sat in a daylong conference. Chef, otherwise known as Tony Cunio, Auburn Mountainview's culinary arts instructor, provides Kenlynn hands-on opportunities to learn new cooking techniques and management styles. Because the Auburn Mountainview program will be adding a sit-down restaurant piece to the program, Kenlynn is acquiring a lot of new information. "Chef is showing me the restaurant side of the industry, which is different than my other kitchen experience, but I am really eager to learn more," remarks Kenlynn.

For instance Kenlynn has adopted Chef's bulleted checklist method, which makes the kitchen run more efficiently. Now that Kenlynn has seen its value she is modeling it to the culinary arts students to use in the kitchen. "The communication and respect I get from the kids when they embrace new concepts like the checklist is what keeps me going and what keeps me here. It's the interaction with the kids I enjoy the most," smiles Kenlynn.

Probably Kenlynn's favorite time of the day is when she's working the till during the lunch rush and gets to have brief moments with the students who are getting their lunches. "I like telling students 'have a good day' or 'thank you' and then seeing how that positive interaction may lift their spirits or put a smile on their face," says Kenlynn.

Over the summer Kenlynn had the chance to spend quality time with some of her favorite people: her grandson, Ethan, her three children, and her high school sweetheart, who also happens to be her husband of 25 years.

Hand-in-hand with the poster contest, students learned a courage pledge and signed the pledge that stated they would band against bullying.

Each week all classroom teachers will lead their students in a classroom meeting meant to teach skills and messages against bullying, and to create a safe community where students can dialogue about their challenges and find solutions.

The Olweus Bullying Prevention Program is a research-based program that reduces current bullying problems and prevents the development of future bullying problems. It also improves the school climate and peer relations. Through school-wide, classroom, individual and community interventions, the program aims to create a warm school environment where adults are interested and involved with the students. The adults consistently use non-hostile and non-physical consequences for unacceptable behaviors.

Research shows that approximately six percent of students bully and nine percent of students are targets of bullying. The remaining 85 percent of students are bystanders. The goal of the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program at Lea Hill Elementary is to shift the power from the small percent of students who are bullying to the majority of children who are not. Bystanders are taught what to do when they see bullying happen and how to create a climate at school that does not tolerate bullying and encourages inclusion.

Five students from the class of 2008 at Auburn Mountainview High School—Jarrod Call, Kathleen Farrell, Kayla Fix, Michelle Happenny and Ryan Scott—and two students from Auburn Riverside High School—Kyle Franz and Jeremy Thomas—have been recognized as Commended Students in the 2008 National Merit Scholarship Program. All seven students placed among the top 5 percent of more than 1.4 million students who entered the competition by taking the Preliminary SAT (PSAT) and National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT) in their junior year.

Of the 1.4 million entrants, some 50,000 with the highest <u>PSAT/NMSQT</u> Selection Index scores (critical reading + mathematics + writing skills scores) qualify for recognition in the National Merit Scholarship Program. In April following the fall test administration, high-scoring participants from every state are invited to name two colleges or universities to which they would like to be referred by NMSC. In September, these high scorers are notified through their schools that they have qualified as either a Commended Student or Semifinalist.

More than two-thirds or about 34,000 of the approximately 50,000 high scorers on the <u>PSAT/NMSQT</u> receive Letters of Commendation in recognition of their outstanding academic promise. Commended Students are named on the basis of a nationally applied Selection Index score that is below the level required for participants to be named Semifinalists in their respective states. Although Commended Students do not continue in the competition for Merit Scholarship awards, some of these students do become candidates for special scholarships sponsored by corporations and businesses.

Art started his teaching career 18 years ago as a third grade teacher. Originally he planned to pursue marine biology and volunteered his time at the Seattle Aquarium. He also sorted biological samples for the EPA Commencement Bay Clean-Up Project. In college, Art enrolled in psychology classes and discovered their appeal but wondered if he would make a significant impact in the world as a psych major. He began reflecting on his former experiences and realized it was the guided tours and teaching he had enjoyed the most during his time at the Seattle Aquarium. Soon thereafter Art earned his bachelor's degree in psychology and a teaching certificate from the University of Washington. He then transitioned into teaching and found it be a wonderful fit. Art also holds a master's degree in educational technology from Lesley University.

Terminal Park Elementary Students Going Green

Reuse. Reduce. Recycle. Rethink. These four words are transforming the way Terminal Park Elementary School students think about waste. After a recent King County Solid Waste Division school-wide assembly, Mike Martin's fourth grade students formed the "Green Team" in response to their desire to cut down on waste.

Kara Swinney, one of the fourth grade Green Team members, understands that waste is harmful to the environment: "We only should take what we can eat at lunch so we're not wasting, but we first have to recognize how much we're wasting—it's not good. Everything doesn't go in the garbage."

The Green Team is kicking off its "Earth Idol" contest by focusing on reuse first. Each month classes will be competing for the Earth Idol title—a title awarded to the class who reuses the most scrap and printer paper. The Green Team has introduced the concept to all students through individual classroom presentations, which educate students about how to reuse both scrap paper and printer paper. "We need to reuse paper more so trees don't get cut down," remarks Kevin Mach, a member of the Green Team. In the presentation, members of the Green Team discuss the detrimental effects of waste and then request every student to commit to reusing scrap and printer paper. "We give each class one box for reusing scrap paper and another for reusing paper that is printed on only one side," says Kara. The printed paper box even instructs students to lay their paper printed side up so it can be easily reinserted into a printer for reuse.

The Green Team's next step is to check in on all the classrooms to ensure students are using the paper reuse bins correctly and frequently. The Green Team members like to call these visits "surprise inspections."

According to Joseph Johnson, another member of the Green Team, "we also recycle plastic and plastic bags, like our breakfast bags and grocery bags from home." Additionally, the Green Team is responsible for the vermicomposting box that sits outside their classroom. "It [vermicomposting] is for when we waste our food; we can feed it to the worms to make good soil," says Kevin. Essentially vermicomposting is the decomposing of organic materials—specifically food waste—by worms to produce a mixture used for fertilizing and conditioning land. "We put wet leaves and torn-up newspaper in eight sections of a bin, then we fill up one section a week for eight weeks with a handful of leftover food from lunch," says Joseph. What happens next is the worms help to decompose the food scraps into organic material that can be used for the fertilization of the school grounds.

"Recycling makes more fresh air for the trees so we don't run out of oxygen," says Kevin. Spencer Steinle, also a Green Team member, knows that "what goes in the garbage like food scraps need to go in the yard waste or composting box." Ultimately, the Green Team wants every student to know and understand these concepts, helping to reshape the way students think about waste and the effects it has on the Earth.

Former Auburn High School Quarterback Honored as National Football Hall of Fame High School Scholar-Athlete of the Year

Kellen Kiilsgaard, former Auburn High School student and standout quarterback, was named as one of five exceptional scholarathletes of the year by the National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame (NFF).

Kellen will be honored during the NFF's Annual Awards Luncheon, presented by Sprinturf, on Tuesday, December 4, 2007, at the Waldorf=Astoria in New York City. First bestowed in 1991, the NFF National High School Scholar-Athlete Award has become one of the most competitive and sought after high school honors in the country. Criteria for the award include but are not limited to academic achievement, athletic accolades and community involvement.

Rated by many experts as one of the top quarterback prospects in the nation during his career at Auburn High School, Kellen Kiilsgaard's success extends far beyond the football field.

During his high school graduation commencement, Kellen claimed the Auburn Elite Faculty Achievement Award. This prestigious award requires two-thirds vote of the staff and is only given to a graduating senior who has brought honor to self and school, reaching beyond the bounds of community and the state. He ranked tenth in a class of 354 while compiling a 3.95 grade point average on a 4.0 scale. Kellen also received the Washington State University Regents Scholar Award.

As a two-way star for the Auburn High School football squad, Kiilsgaard was chosen to Prepstar's All-American Team. During his senior campaign, the QB threw for 1,020 yards and 13 touchdowns and rushed 973 yards and another 23 touchdowns, leading his team to the state semifinals and a 12-1 record. At free safety, he notched 57 tackles and four interceptions. He also kicked 56 of 59 extra points while maintaining a 39.7 punt average.

The Associated Press named him All-State First-Team quarterback and All-State First-Team defensive back. The 6-foot-3 and 220 pound Kiilsgaard earned Player of the Year honors from The Seattle Post-Intelligencer and The Tacoma News Tribune. The News Tribune and the Auburn Reporter also choose him as the Male Athlete of the Year. He finished his remarkable career as his school's all-time leader in almost every offensive category.

Kiilsgaard also excelled in baseball, earning All-State First-Team honors and spots on The Seattle Times and The Tacoma New Tribune All-Area baseball squads. Kellen became the first high school athlete to hit a homerun at Mariners Safeco Stadium and was also selected to throw out the Ceremonial First Pitch at a Mariners game.

Excellence in the classroom and in athletics only tells part of Kiilsgaard's story. Recently, he stepped into the realm of hero, swimming to rescue a 250-pound man and his 7 year-old daughter from choppy seas while vacationing in Maui, Hawaii. He received the Hometown Hero Award from the City of Auburn; was recognized by the Red Cross; and has been nominated for a Carnegie Medal for his gallant actions. He also mentors a "Little Brother" as part of Big Brothers and Big Sisters of America.

"The greatest Student-Athlete is the one that can excel in the classroom and set an example of behavior and citizenship for all students to follow," says Auburn High School Principal Paul Harvey. "Kellen is that kind of student and he has not forgotten his responsibilities as a student and that he is part of a community that is much larger than he is, and he has handled all of it with poise and humility."

Kellen is currently attending Stanford University on a full athletics scholarship while a member of the Cardinal football team.

With more than one million student-athletes playing high school football each year, the NFF chapter network, comprised of 120 chapters with 12,000 members, annually reviews the credentials of players from more than 4,800 high schools. Each chapter analyzes countless local candidates for their academic achievement, athletic performance and exemplary leadership, and collectively the chapters annually award 2,500 deserving student-athletes with more than \$800,000 in annual scholarships. From this group of 2,500, a national committee selects five individuals for the recognition as NFF National High School Scholar-Athletes.

Pioneer Elementary School Awarded \$23,000 Group Health Grant

Pioneer Elementary School was awarded the Group Health Children and Teen grant for \$23,174.36 to enhance its before-school fitness and nutrition program called "Morning Madness."

Morning Madness will promote good physical fitness, where students will learn and experience the importance of regular physical activity and proper nutrition in maintaining a healthy lifestyle. Students will make physical fitness gains in the areas of aerobic endurance, muscular strength and endurance, and flexibility, as measured by the Presidential Physical Fitness Awards. Students will make healthier nutritional choices with the guidance and support of a Registered Dietitian (RD) from Washington State University's Food \$ense Program. The RD will also teach students how to grow fruits and vegetables and make healthy recipes.

Students will meet for 30 minutes before school on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. A typical session will include a 5-minute group warm-up activity such as running or jump rope and stretching. They will then rotate between 7-12 stations for 20 minutes of circuit training—working in small groups or individually. Students will learn how to measure and calculate their Body Mass Index (BMI).

Health and Fitness Nights for families will be held at Pioneer Elementary School two times during the six-month program. The first family night will kick off the program and the second family night will occur toward the conclusion of the program and highlight the students' progress.

Dick Scobee Elementary School Building "Wall of Respect"

"Let me get the door for you." "Go ahead before me." "May I help you with that?" These are just a few of the comments Dick Scobee Elementary School students are sharing with each other throughout the school day.

At the beginning of the school year, Dick Scobee principal Greg Brown decided to kick off the "Building a Wall of Respect" program after teacher Beth Raines suggested a similar concept to Mr. Brown. "I thought it was a great idea and a great way to encourage kids to start thinking about others," says Mr. Brown.

Essentially the students earn "Caught Being Respectful!" tickets from any staff member who witnesses them being kind, respectful or considerate. Mr. Brown emphasizes that the Building a Wall of Respect program encourages pay-it-forward type behaviors, not necessarily good behaviors. "Holding the door open for others; picking up trash; letting someone else go first in line are all behaviors worthy of a Caught Being Respectful! ticket," says Mr. Brown. Once a student earns two tickets, he or she redeems them for a paper brick that says, "I was caught!" The students take the "bricks" home to share with their parents and to decorate. Then the decorated bricks are added to the "Wall of Respect" in Dick Scobee's kitchen/lunchroom.

Just the other day a student on the way to school crashed on his bike. Two fellow classmates saw the accident and immediately helped the student up and walked him and his bike to school. The students even led him to the health room to receive medical attention. "The students have really bought into the activity; it's really exciting to see them reach out to each other," exclaims Mr. Brown. Now Mr. Brown frequently hears how students are only a ticket away from earning their brick, or that they just earned their brick. Some students already have four bricks on the Wall of Respect.

In no time, one full side of the kitchen/lunchroom will be plastered with bricks, which, according to Mr. Brown, means students will have paid it forward two times the number of bricks. In three short months the program has not only created a colorful mural in the kitchen/lunchroom, but it has also inspired the student body to think about others first. "It is really inspiring to see!" remarks Mr. Brown.

In life and on the job, Lisa Mason, Chinook's physical education specialist, is not known for laying low or staying still. "I like to participate in a lot of sports; I can't be stagnant. I like to be learning all the time." Having spent junior high and high school playing basketball, volleyball, softball and racquetball, Lisa recognizes that physical fitness plays a huge role in her life—then and now.

Lisa's goal is to pass down her love of sport to youngsters. Her teaching philosophy is to expose students to a wide variety of physical fitness skills and to inform them about health and wellness. Lisa is a firm believer in keeping up with new trends and styles of teaching in physical education. For instance, Lisa attends Bud Turner's annual "West's Best K-12 PE Workshop" known for introducing educators and coaches to innovative fitness instruction. Through such opportunities, Lisa has learned more about non-

traditional activities like Chinese yo-yos, sport stacking, juggling and rock climbing. "These activities really expose kids to things they might otherwise not be able to do. Our school climbing wall is a perfect example," says Lisa. "It was not easy to acquire a climbing wall, but it has proven a great activity for kids." In April 2006, Lisa created the Chinook Striders, an after-school running club open to Chinook students and their families, after she noticed that only a small percentage of her students were meeting Presidential Physical Fitness goals. Lisa knew many children did not have opportunities to engage in directed physical activity and wanted to offer them an option for exercise, so Lisa created the running program to increase students' physical activity. Lisa recently wrote a \$10,000 Saucony Run for Good grant to secure funding for the program.

Lisa introduces activities to her students one unit at a time. Currently her first through fifth graders are tumbling, balancing and climbing on gymnastics equipment. Among other things, students also get to bowl, dance and run. "Because I have been an athlete all my life," says Lisa, "I've picked up a lot of activities along the way, like golf and bowling during college." Lisa has also taken courses in track and field, dance and basic movement to further her understanding of instruction of physical fitness activities.

Lisa has taught physical education at Chinook for 13 years and began her teaching career 20 years ago. Lisa holds a Masters in educational technology from Gonzaga University, and she earned her dual certification in physical education and health from Oregon State University. Lisa began teaching physical education and health at a K-8 school in Astoria, Oregon. After four rewarding years, Lisa left for Washington State and landed a position at Terminal Park Elementary School. Three years later, Lisa moved to Chinook. "Initially, I didn't intend to teach elementary students," remarks Lisa. "Once I started, I found that I really liked the younger kids. They are enthusiastic at this level, and I like that. When a student tells me they love PE and I'm their favorite PE teacher, it's hard not to love my job."

Last year Lisa won the 2006 King County Physical Activity Coalition Excellence in Teaching Award for being an outstanding physical education specialist in King County. She attributes her success as a physical fitness educator to her love of sports and her father's example as an educator of excellence.

Lisa continues to pursue an active lifestyle outside of her classroom. Lisa has been professionally trained in Taekwondo. She also rock climbs, cross country skies, snow shoes, and, most recently, trains for and races in triathlons. "When I learn something new," says Lisa, "I can bring that knowledge into my teaching. For example, I've been able to teach my students different grips to try in rock climbing, and triathlons have given me the opportunity to speak with kids about goal setting and how to prepare for a race that requires endurance and pacing." Because Lisa is still willing to learn, she ensures that her students continue to learn.

Lisa's experience has allowed her to give salient input to several district committees including two curriculum adoption committees and the 2004-05 Childhood Fitness and Nutrition Citizens' Ad-Hoc Committee. Lisa makes it her goal to get involved at the district level with anything related to health and fitness. "I want to know what is going on and keep current," says Lisa, "but I also want to influence the outcome, serving my students both in and out of the classroom."

Ultimately, Lisa wants to provide children with the opportunity to find something active—something they can continue to enjoy for years to come. "Not everyone has to be playing a sport," says Lisa, "but everyone can find something active that they're good at and enjoy in their everyday life." It's Lisa's goal to help children find it.

One of DeDe's favorite memories—what she coins a "Wow" moment—is listening to a little boy who was nonverbal when he began the ECE program at Lake View now speak aloud as a second grader. "You feel like you are a part of the successes because you've helped," says DeDe.

Aside from busy volunteer schedules, Ryan and DeDe both work full-time. Ryan works for a paper distribution company, while DeDe just recently began a real estate career. Their three children—one sixth grader and two second graders—keep them busy with activities and school work. In addition, DeDe is the director of The Foundation for Nager and Miller Syndromes (FNMS). Terminal Park's fourth grade teacher Michael Martin has blended two sides of education with one goal in mind: to provide his young students the best academic and social environment possible. Initially, Mr. Martin pursued environmental education in college because of his love for the outdoors and the more hands-on education approach. He thought he would eventually end up a forest ranger or perhaps a teacher at an outdoor school, until he began volunteering in elementary school classrooms as a part of his class assignments. "It helped me realize the classroom is where I really wanted to be," says Mr. Martin, "even though transitioning from a more liberal environment to a more structured one was an adjustment."

Mr. Martin is in his third year of teaching and finding it more fulfilling each year. Over the three years, Mr. Martin has found a happy medium in providing his fourth graders excellent academic skills within the classroom structure, and the opportunity to participate in environmentally conscious programs like Terminal Park's student-based recycling team, called the Green Team, which created a school-wide paper recycling competition to increase students' consciousness about the benefits of recycling.

Day-to-day, Mr. Martin's students focus on the core academics of reading, writing and math. Mr. Martin uses many math games for students to practice basic operation drills and a variety of group assignments where students not only learn the material, but also how to interact with each other. "It's important that kids learn how to get along with other kids and adults, and how to be good role models and citizens," remarks Mr. Martin.

Mr. Martin's new favorite curriculum is "Writing Workshop," a curriculum that teaches students how to become writers via prewriting lessons. "Writing is more than teaching students how to write to a format," says Mr. Martin.

One of Mr. Martin's proudest moments on the job occurred in his first year of teaching. "I had a student who came in at the beginning of the school year reading almost two grade levels below normal but ended the school year reading almost two grades above normal!" exclaims Mr. Martin.

Beyond academics, Mr. Martin believes it his part of his teaching responsibility to be a good role model for his students. His class motto is: think before you act. "As my students transition from just being in school to becoming responsible young people, they have to start thinking about things others have done for them for most of their life," says Mr. Martin. "They have to begin making choices about whether or not to finish their homework or what to eat or how to dispose of their paper after it's used, which is why I like to set a good example of being a good citizen. These things they may not acquire from a class assignment."

This year Mr. Martin took over the after-school Snack 'n Study program. The voluntary program is available to students who need some quiet time to do their homework after school and a place to seek additional assistance.

Mr. Martin actively takes advantage of district and out-of-district in-services and workshops. Last year he completed the district's two-year teacher induction support program and came away with a lot of great teaching ideas to improve instruction and better target instruction to fit the needs of all students. "Trainings get me excited and the kids get excited to do something new," says Mr. Martin.

Mr. Martin is no stranger to Auburn or the Auburn School District. He attended Pioneer Elementary, Olympic Junior High and Auburn Riverside High School, followed by two years at Green River Community College and two more years at Western Washington, where he completed his bachelor's degree in environmental and elementary education. He will begin pursuing his masters and ProCert through City University next fall. Currently, Mr. Martin and his wife reside on Capitol Hill in Seattle.

Auburn School District Places Four-Year Educational Program and Operations Levy on the Tuesday, March 11 Ballot

On January 14, the Auburn School District Board of Directors unanimously approved Resolution 1092 to place a four-year replacement educational program and operations levy on the Tuesday, March 11, 2008 ballot for local voters' approval.

The replacement educational program and operations levy will provide funding for approximately 18 percent of the programs and services offered in the Auburn School District.

A replacement educational program and operations levy requires local voter approval

to continue the current education programs and services provided to local students. The levy will collect \$25,300,000 in 2009; \$27,600,000 in 2010; \$29,400,000 in 2011; and \$31,400,000 in 2012. The proposed four-year levy will replace the expiring 2007 and 2008 levies. (Levies are not cumulative and must be renewed to maintain current educational programs, as each year replaces the previous year's levy.)

The levy funds will be used to provide for portions of the educational programs not supported by the state's basic education allocations. Underfunded programs include: basic instructional programs; education of students with disabilities; gifted education; maintenance and custodial services; and transportation operations.

Many programs are not funded at all by the state and are completely dependent on levy dollars. They include all athletics and activities such as soccer, football, track, debate, band and orchestra.

The actual 2007 levy tax rate is \$2.63 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. It had been projected to be \$2.78. The projected 2008 levy tax rate is \$2.78. If the four-year replacement levies are approved, the projected tax rates for 2009 and 2010 will drop to \$2.54, and for 2011 and 2012 will drop to \$2.53.

If approved, the four-year replacement educational program and operations levy will provide stable funding for schools. The total tax rate, which includes previously approved construction bonds and a technology levy, is projected to be \$4.49 per \$1,000 of assessed property value in 2009 and then decrease in future years.

Taylor always strives to do her best in the classroom and in all of her pursuits. For instance, Taylor recently participated in the Global Reading Challenge and set a goal to not only complete all 10 required global reading books, but to also continue reading her personal book selections. During the after-school science club, Taylor participates in experiments to enhance her classroom experience, and she takes every opportunity to improve her dance and piano skills with daily practice and competitions. Taylor recognizes she is always on the go, but she likes it that way. "I don't have to do it; I like to do it," remarks Taylor.

Recently Taylor and her good friend Gabby Wills came up with the idea to raise money for a local camp for children with serious lifealtering conditions such as Muscular Dystrophy and cancer. Korey was the nephew of a friend of Taylor's family who passed away from cancer. Camp Korey was founded soon thereafter and will open to its first campers in July of this year. Because the camp will need ongoing support to provide this special opportunity for children in need, Taylor and Gabby took it upon themselves to create a fundraiser called Carnival Korey at Hazelwood on May 10. abuse from the University of Iowa and shortly thereafter moved to Auburn, as her parents and siblings had moved to the Pacific Northwest when she was in college.

Francy's professional background in drug and alcohol counseling and mental health counseling secured her a job at Auburn Youth Resources upon her arrival. She discovered that she enjoyed working with adolescents and their families, so she went back to school and earned her school counseling certification. In 1991 West Auburn moved into its brand-new building, and Francy was hired as the school counselor.

Over her 17 years of service at West Auburn, Francy can faithfully say she's never been bored on the job. "I really do have a new job every year when I come back," says Francy, "because whenever there is a change in building programs or there is something new we must focus on, it changes what I do. I really like finding a way to make it work." Francy comes to work every day prepared to tackle whatever comes her way. She considers herself an informational resource and problem-solver for students and their families, whether it is to help a student schedule the right courses or provide a reference for a therapist.

Francy appreciates the team-based community at West Auburn and attributes the students' success to this environment. "Students come here because the traditional setting has not worked for them in some way. West Auburn staff helps them get as far as possible with their education and makes school a positive experience." Francy and her colleagues create a personalized setting for every student, which encourages communication between students and staff. "We offer our students hope and show them there is a way. That makes this building very special," remarks Francy.

Francy does not have one defining moment in her time at West Auburn, but graduation day is one of her favorite times. It is a milestone for all students, but especially for those who may be the first member of their family to earn a high school diploma. Francy also enjoys visiting with former students who return to campus, "shining and happy," as she puts it.

In Francy's spare time, she works part-time for Auburn Youth Resources in the drug and alcohol intervention program. She believes the professional connection keeps her abreast of changes and trends in the field. She also keeps current on her mental health and chemical dependency licenses—not because she is required to have them, but because she believes they help her practice with a more holistic approach. "I want to be the best counselor I can be," says Francy.

The core of Francy's personal life is her family, eight grandchildren and friends, who, according to Francy, "are awesome and simply the best. They are my roots and wings."

Mr. Martin helps to facilitate the program, from logistics to student presentations. The Green Team has introduced the concept of waste reduction to all students through individual classroom presentations. The Green Team is also responsible for checking in on all the classrooms to ensure students are using the paper reuse bins correctly and frequently. The Green Team members like to call these visits "surprise inspections."

The Green Team also accepts and recycles plastic, like the student's breakfast bags and grocery bags from home. Additionally, the Green Team started to compost food scraps using a worm bin, otherwise known as a vermicomposting box, which sits outside their classroom.

Auburn School District 2008-09 Kindergarten Registration and Round-Up Schedule

Kindergarten registration for Auburn School District's 2008-09 school year will begin on Monday, April 14, 2008. Elementary schools will be open for registration between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. daily. Parents are encouraged to register their five-year-old children on or shortly after this date. Early registration helps the schools plan effectively, have sufficient staff and create a smooth introduction for students entering kindergarten.

Parents must bring their child's official birth certificate and a current immunization record at the time of registration. State law requires parents to present immunization information documenting that their children meet the state requirements before being registered at school.

The local elementary schools can provide a list of all needed immunizations, or view them online at http://www.auburn.wednet.edu/immunization/Default.htm. Required immunizations include:

- MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) 2 doses 1st dose on or after first birthday; 2nd dose at least 28 days after 1st dose
- DTaP (diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis) 4 doses if last dose is on or after fourth birthday
- Polio:
 - *3 doses if last dose is on or after fourth birthday
 - *4 doses if all doses are before fourth birthday
- **Hepatitis B** (3-shot series)
- Varicella (chicken pox) 2 doses 1st dose on or after first birthday; blood titer or medical provider diagnosis is needed for verification of disease

She believes that if she connects with students before they begin their day, she may be able to address problems that occur before the school day begins.

Mrs. Krantz has implemented school-wide character education and anti-bullying curriculum. She also serves as Hazelwood's coordinator of both the guidance team and 504 plans within the building, which provide modifications and accommodations that help students with special needs gain better access to academic rigor.

This year the group of kids has worked really well together. They listen to each other and take their time in responding to questions," says Mr. Grab. Beth approaches her teaching with an attitude of more is better. "We provide so much more than educating kids; sometimes we're called mom or dad by accident because the students see us every day, and school is a place where many children find stability," remarks Beth. "I've always said, 'Once you've been my student, you're always my student." In fact, during Beth's first year at Dick Scobee, one of her former first grade students returned to student teach in Beth's classroom. "She told me I made the most difference in her life and it was my class where she decided she wanted to become a teacher," says Beth. Another former student invited Beth to his wedding. "When students come back and say I really was important to them, it reaffirms what I'm doing professionally," says Beth.

As a third grade teacher, Beth teaches all subjects. "From reviewing WASL stem questions to teaching students how to eat healthy, there is never a dull moment," smiles Beth. Recently Dick Scobee kicked off a healthy eating program in conjunction with the Washington State University Food Sense Program. The program teaches students how to cook and eat healthy. Beth's students made spring rolls from scratch one week. "The kids are so proud of themselves after they've done all the prep and cooking. A lot of students will try vegetables and other foods they may not otherwise try because they've created the meals themselves," says Beth.

Beth is a firm believer in parent involvement and believes she can better understand a child's learning needs and personality if she knows where the child is coming from at home. According to Beth, "Parents need to be involved in their child's education. Sometimes educating the parents on how to work with their kids at home is just as important as educating the students in the classroom."

Over the years, Beth has committed herself to lifelong learning. She has participated on multiple district committees, including a Substitute Committee, which she is currently serving on. Beth knows that continuing her education will only better her students' education. Recently Beth shared new math skills with her class that she learned at a local math conference. "When I share with the kids that I try something new, I think it makes it easier for them to try new things," says Beth. "It's important that they know I am still learning."

Beth's students probably also like the fact that their teacher is a huge sports fan. Beth has coached fifth and sixth grade boys' basketball and girls' volleyball. It's hard to miss the life-size poster of Philadelphia Eagle's standout Donovan McNabb in her room—a gift from one of her student's parents. Beth is a football fanatic. When she was little her dad took her to games and she would run around in a football helmet despite the fact that her parents dressed her up as a cheerleader. Her love of the game continued and she played flag football in college for a year. She even tried out for a local professional women's football team, the Tacoma Majestics. "It was the greatest thing ever—full pads, full tackle. I trained hard and signed up but got injured before the first game, so I had to give it up," says Beth.

Beth holds a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Seattle Pacific University and a master's degree in multidisciplinary education from Lesley College. She is a devoted mom to two boys, an eighth grader and third grader, and her husband is a US Army

The Auburn School District Transportation Department's "Partnership Approach to Safe Routes to School" program has been declared a Top 50 Program of the 2008 Innovations in American Government Awards competition, administered by the Ash Institute for Democratic Governance and Innovation at Harvard Kennedy School.

Selected from a pool of nearly 1,000 applicants, the "Partnership Approach to Safe Routes to School" program represents the best in government innovation.

The "Partnership Approach to Safe Routes to School" innovation addresses two common large-scale problems: transportation inefficiency and childhood inactivity. The core of the innovation is the partnerships formed between the school district and community residents and professionals, which are hardly a traditional element in school transportation plans. The purpose of the partnerships is to

increase the practice of walking and cycling to school by creating safer school walking/cycling routes for the Auburn School District's 14,500 students. The program has proven itself—providing safe walk routes to 20 percent of the district's student body population. And because more children are walking/cycling to/from school, the transportation department is eliminating unnecessary routes within walk areas—saving the district money on personnel and fuel costs—and helping to increase childhood fitness.

Being in the Top 50 means that the "Partnership Approach to Safe Routes to School" program will be competing for a \$100,000 award. Finalists will be announced on June 3, 2008. On June 12, 2008, finalist programs will make presentations on their initiatives before the National Selection Committee. The winners of the 2008 Innovations in American Government Awards will be announced and honored at an awards gala and reception in September of 2008.

Established in 1985 at Harvard Kennedy School by the Ford Foundation, the Innovations in American Government Awards Program is designed to improve government practice by honoring effective government initiatives and encouraging the dissemination of such best practices across the country. "I lived in my car for the first two months just soliciting restaurants to donate free lunches to the winning classrooms at each school," says Jeani. "We are so grateful to the wonderful restaurant support we have been given each year." She was also responsible for securing key contact persons from each school who would be in charge of coordinating the drive within their own schools and who would communicate directly with her. Thanks to Superintendent Linda Cowan, the details were arranged for tote deliveries and pick-ups from each school. More challenges arose when looking for extra storage space and the sorting of the food after the drive. The Auburn Food Bank has it all under control now thanks to Director Debbie Christian and Kayla Sargent of the Auburn Food Bank. Jeani also praises the volunteerism of Steve Christiansen, music teacher at Arthur Jacobsen Elementary School, who is the liaison between the school district and Auburn Food Bank Director Debbie Christian and Jeani. Members of the Auburn Food Bank board are now participating in many aspects of the drive as well, and this year the local grocery stores have stepped up to participate in a variety of ways. Jeani is thrilled to see how the drive has evolved into a full community effort.

Now in its fourth year, the Auburn All-Schools Food Drive recently brought in a whopping 65,000 pounds of food and \$7,000 in cash. "What is so great about this, especially the cash donations, is that the cash buying power of food for a non-profit is six times more than the retail value. So our \$7,000 really totals \$42,000 worth of product," explains Jeani.

According to Jeani, the Auburn Food Bank, with the support of the district, is hoping to move next year's All-Schools Food Drive to March instead of January. Typically January is a good month to secure a large amount of donations due to the fact that most people who've donated during the holidays forget about the continued need once the New Year begins. However, the Auburn Food Bank discovered an East Coast philanthropist who will match the amount of money raised at food drives that occur in March. "This is a great opportunity and just one more way the Food Bank can expand its resources," says Jeani.

What sticks with Jeani more than the thousands of pounds of food and money donated has to be what the food drive teaches children. "As a teacher, what got me started with the food drive was using it as a vehicle to demonstrate to children how important it is to give back. It's important to get kids thinking how they can think beyond themselves and help others, which is exactly what the food drive gets kids to do," remarks Jeani.

Jeani also volunteers at the local food bank in Othello, Washington, when it's open on Fridays. She and husband George's business is in Othello, so it's important to her and her husband that they give back to that community. One year their hunting club published a game bird recipe cookbook and donated 100 percent of the proceeds to the Othello Food Bank.

When not volunteering, Jeani is most likely traveling around the nation teaching other educators the ins and outs of differentiated instruction as a consultant for the Bureau of Education and Research. "I enjoy teaching best practices and helping other educators institute them at their schools," says Jeani.

For instance, fifth graders go through the DARE program to learn about making educated choices and how those choices impact their life and those around them; they attend fifth grade camp, which for some is their first trip away from family, and learn what it means to be part of a cabin team; they learn about the democratic process, leadership and teamwork through student body functions like the annual food drive and spirit days; and they participate in Junior Achievement's Biztown, which teaches them how to be a business team as well as how to manage their own checkbook.

According to Debbi, "You never teach in isolation; you always teach with others whether it be grade level partners, other staff members or parents." For example, in preparing for fifth grade camp, the custodian teaches students proper flag etiquette; the music specialist teaches the camp songs; and the PE specialist teaches compassing. Debbi and Arthur Jacobsen's librarian, Art Spencer, have also teamed up. Recently, Art led the students in the production of a live pod cast, which was aired over the Internet. Even parents were able to log onto the AJ website and listen.

Debbi attributes her team-teaching philosophy to Donna Smith, her first principal at Terminal Park Elementary School. She recalls Donna coming to her that first year and saying she needed to get out of her classroom and socialize more with the staff. She took that literally and went to Hawaii with third grade teaching partner Anna Grant. "Working and socializing with staff members made teaching easier, and my teaching became better quality for my students," says Debbi.

Some of Debbi's fondest teaching memories include her four-five split classes at Pioneer. "I love splits because you can do so much more integrating," remarks Debbi. Debbi's students created a buddy brochure for new students. There were also many PowerPoint presentations such as, "The Dams of Washington." "I'd have a thought and Dave Hoskin [Pioneer's librarian] would just go with it; as a result, the students were able to create some amazing projects," smiles Debbi.

Now Debbi is establishing new memories and traditions at AJ. The AJ staff is very family-oriented and social. Recently the staff lounge was covered in baby photos of the staff to spark conversation. Even the students got involved when they were asked to guess their teacher's identity from their grade school photo in the foyer.

Debbi's team approach translates into her home life as well. She is a busy wife and mother of two, who thanks her mother and appreciates her husband for working together to care for their children while she teaches during the school day. Debbi's husband, David, also works for the district as the head custodian for Terminal Park Elementary School. Debbi and her family live in Enumclaw, not too far from Black Diamond, which is where Debbi grew up. Debbi's family is very important to her, and she considers them her hobby. "If I could clone myself, I would, because then I could be at AJ as much as I want to and also be with my family 100 percent of the time," says Debbi.

Just as Debbi loves teaching, she hopes all her students become happy, productive team players who find careers in life that they enjoy.

He knew he wanted to continue volunteering in retirement, so in 2001, after Ron retired from Boeing, he contacted the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), which connected him to volunteer opportunities at Pioneer and Dick Scobee Elementary Schools.

Ron has had the good fortune of working with third and fourth grade teacher Dani Rowe at Pioneer Elementary School for seven years. "We have a good team going," smiles Ron. "Whatever students need help with I am available to assist them." Ron volunteers in Ms. Rowe's room two days per week. He primarily helps students who are struggling in a particular subject or falling behind in their homework. He also reviews test material with students at the end of the year. According to Ms. Rowe, "My classes love having him and he is an outstanding role model for my kids." Like many teachers, Ron finds great satisfaction when the children grasp a particular concept. The Auburn School District Board of Directors recognized Christine Anderson, language arts specialist at Washington Elementary School, for her outstanding service on Monday, June 9, at 7 p.m. in the board room at the James P. Fugate Administration Building.

Christine Anderson has been the language arts specialist at Washington Elementary School for 16 years. Her primary roles include: coordinating the reading and language arts program and Title I program for the building; ensuring district-adopted curriculum is implemented; and providing staff development.

On any given day, an average of 110 students rotate through Christine's language arts classroom who are reading below grade level and need small group intensive instruction to reach standard. Students are selected for the intervention program based on the results of a building-wide reading assessment. Christine and three paraeducators who work alongside Christine also offer after-school extended learning for reading. "We offer as many intervention, enrichment and extended learning programs as we have funding for," says Christine. Christine's paraeducator team currently consists of Karen O'Brien and Lorinda Bittle, whom she has been working with since she arrived at Washington 16 years ago, and Shirley Partridge, who she has been working with for 11 years. According to Christine, "It is a joy to work every day with such positive and knowledgeable people."

Christine and her team witness significant student improvement daily and work hard to make meaningful and targeted instruction at each child's grade level. Christine recalls a specific instance with a second grader who entered the classroom only knowing seven words. During the school year, Christine met with the student in small group instruction five days a week for 45 minutes a day, which provided the student the opportunity to learn how to read. Toward the end of the school year, the student brought his homerun baseball to class and left it on a desk, which Christine was quick to point out to the student. "He came up to me and said, 'Why don't you keep it? You taught me how to read,'" recalls Christine.

Christine is more than a gifted classroom teacher, she also is a leader in her field. After 30 plus years in the classroom, she has a lot of information on hand to share with her colleagues—especially the next generation of teachers—from her years devoted to professional

development. Christine and her colleague from Hazelwood, Erin Scott, have created staff development for the district's new teacher training for seven years and participated on the Washington State Reading Leadership Cadre, which is post-graduate level training to train reading leaders throughout the state. Additionally, Christine has been honored with the 2005 Auburn School District Teacher of the Year award and was selected to attend Washington D.C. with the school principal to accept Washington's Blue Ribbon award, which was presented by Bill Clinton in the White House.

Christine trusts her professional pursuits have had a positive influence on quality reading instruction throughout the district. "I know that students in our building are making growth on a daily basis, which is very rewarding," says Christine. Christine has also served on the WASL Standard Setting Committee and the WASL Assessments Alignment Committee for Reading.

Christine attributes much of her longevity and success at Washington to its strong-knit community. According to Christine, "Being a neighborhood school means we get to know families over time—from brothers and sisters to former students who now have children in the school." One of Christine's favorite family activities is the end-of-the-year ice cream social where parents and students join to celebrate student accomplishments. Christine's commitment to kids and society is evident in her teaching, and she truly believes that if she can teach children to read they can do anything.

Despite a busy workload, Christine enjoys her time off, especially weekends at her family's cabin on the Key Peninsula. She and her husband also enjoy taking road trips with their 1964 356 Porsche, along with other members of the NW Porsche chapter.

Christine's commitment to her family mirrors her commitment to her students. She is grateful for her family's support of her career and even remembers those Sunday afternoons after church when she and her husband, son and daughter picked up lunch and then headed straight for her classroom so she could prepare for the next week of school. "It's a family affair," smiles Christine.

Mt. Baker Middle School Seventh Grade Language Arts/Social Studies Teacher

Ann's creative teaching style, commitment to lifelong learning and dedication to reach all of her students at their learning level make her this year's middle level outstanding Teacher of the Year.

It doesn't take long to notice Ann's passion for her students—whether it is students engaging in Socratic debate or visiting the sites of Washington, D.C. and New York City over Spring Break. Currently Ann teaches honors language arts and social studies to seventh graders at Mt. Baker. It is her professional goal to motivate students to think and ask questions about their world on a daily basis. "It's really about sparking their curiosity for learning," says Ann. "The Socratic debates help to spark their curiosity through dialogue among each other." Socratic seminars are used to promote dialogue among a group of individuals through metacognitive strategies. "The dialogue makes students think about their own thinking," remarks Ann. "It also teaches students etiquette and communication skills."

Ann uses such activities to empower students so that they believe they can do anything they put their mind to—even if that means overcoming difficult obstacles. Speaking from her own experiences, Ann shares with her students personal anecdotes about the hurdles she has faced and overcome in life. In college, Ann had a professor who told her to get out of education. "I knew it's what I wanted to do, so I had to overcome that obstacle of someone telling me I would fail at it," says Ann. Ann's personal anecdotes and care for her students make life in the classroom a reciprocal relationship between teacher and student. "I try to get to know kids on a personal basis in September. Forming a relationship with them before they begin to learn means they are more responsive when it is time to learn," remarks Ann.

After receiving her bachelor's degree in psychology in 1981, Ann taught fifth and sixth grades in the Kent School District for 15 years. In 1993, Ann's stepdaughter was working with students with special needs at Mt. Baker through Americorps and mentioned to Ann how she thought Ann's personality would be a great fit at a school like Mt. Baker. Thanks to good timing, there was a language arts/social studies opening at Mt. Baker and Ann didn't hesitate to apply.

Since entering the Mt. Baker hallways, Ann feels fortunate to work with such amazing staff and students. She also felt led to pursue her masters in literacy nearly 20 years after receiving her B.A. "It was great to learn new ideas and technology and begin sharing with other teachers," says Ann. "Now I can use PowerPoint to teach a lesson to my visual learners, which helps me to teach to the different modalities. The use of technology in my teaching has really changed my style of teaching."

Ann is involved in various building and district reading and literacy committees and attended the national differentiated instruction conference last year. Michelle raises the "teaching" bar through her commitment and passion for her students and colleagues, risk taking and high expectations. She is this year's elementary level outstanding Teacher of the Year.

"I know the kids I'm teaching today are our leaders of tomorrow," says Michelle. "It is part of my job to prepare students to become good citizens and leaders so they can take this country forward." Michelle understands that many of her students do not receive the support they need at home; therefore, she is one more person who can care for and teach her students how to believe in themselves and live life to their potential.

Nine years ago, Michelle was hired as a first grade teacher at Pioneer and then decided to pursue second grade for a few years. In 2002, Pioneer had an opening for a TOSA instructor. Essentially, the position would reduce class sizes throughout the building during small-group reading blocks. Michelle considered the opportunity and decided to take a risk and go for it, as she felt

ready for a change. The chance to teach reading to students at all grade levels and to connect to the reading groups despite not being the students' classroom teacher sounded both different and challenging.

Michelle has fulfilled her role as TOSA with flying colors. She not only reaches students in her own classes, but also students across the district. She has presented the latest "best practices" on reading strategies to Pioneer, Hazelwood and Terminal Park Elementary staff. Additionally, she has served on various OSPI committees and scored portions of the reading WASL. "I am interested in sharing what is taking place at the state level with my fellow teachers," says Michelle, "because it has a direct impact on the instructional practice of teachers in the school and district." Michelle also recently obtained her national board certification, what she deemed to be a challenging yet rewarding process. "I learned a lot about what I do well and what I can work on," says Michelle.

Michelle takes the time to build community at Pioneer, particularly with the parents. She has offered two Love and Logic evening classes to parents and teachers. The strategies learned help one to create a more positive adult/child relationship. It's especially important that Michelle reach the parents whose children are not yet in school. "Helping young children from birth to school age by reading to them, talking with them and holding them helps them enter school better prepared in their minds and hearts," remarks Michelle.

Michelle is excited and proud of her accomplishment, primarily because she knows she represents the great work of all educators. Michelle and her family look forward to celebrate her success.
